1."Lessons in Chemistry" by Bonnie Garmus

Following woman chemist Elizabeth Zott, this fiction book brings lots of laughs to the page as readers navigate the early 1960s and the gender inequality that exists in society at the time, particularly within the chemistry space. Discover how Elizabeth navigates her life as a mother and a cooking show star where she shows off her revolutionary cooking skills that combine chemistry, confidence and courage.

2. "Four Thusand Weeks: Time Management for Mortals" by Oliver Burkeman

Oliver Burkeman brings readers an intriguing guide to time and time management, showcasing the obsession humans have with long to-do lists and constant productivity and how that obsession ties to self-worth. In support of all humans making the most of our roughly four thousand weeks of life, Burkeman draws insights from both ancient and contemporary philosophers, psychologists and spiritual teachers to reshape our approach to living fully as the clock continues to tick

3. "A Dutiful Boy" by Mohsin Zaidi




4. "Undelivered: The Never-Heard Speeches That Would Have Rewritten History" by Jeff Nussbaum


